# **NEW WEBSITE FOR GREETWELL**

At the beginning of 2020 Lincolnshire County Council informed parishes that as it was having a new accessible and mobile-friendly website town and parish council websites linked to the LCC website (such as Greetwell's) would be required to be upgraded. This would bring them up to date with the latest accessibility requirements.

This announcement came as a surprise to parishes and alarm to parish clerks, whom the majority are not trained in Website design! However it is done, thanks to a resident in Sudbrooke who has produced it for Greetwell (and 55 more parishes) at no charge - many parish councils have spent a considerable amount of money in upgrading their websites. The Lincolnshire Association of Local Councils felt it appropriate to ask those parishes that had had their websites created free of charge if they would consider making a donation, which they would administer, between the RAF Benevolent Fund and the Guide Dogs for the Blind. Greetwell Parish Council has donated £50.00.

# PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Your Council has continued to meet remotely, and its latest meeting on 15<sup>th</sup> February was held by Zoom. The agendas are displayed on the noticeboards in the parish and on the website. All residents are welcome to attend the meetings and can obtain the joining link from the Clerk by contacting her on <u>greetwellparishcouncil@gmail.com</u> by noon on the day of the meeting.

**New Councillor -** A new member is welcomed to the Council – Joshua Leafe, a resident of Westfield Drive, North Greetwell.

**Budget for 2021/22** - The Council set the Parish Precept at its December meeting at £9,600.00 as follows:-

Administration, Clerks Salary, Superannuation, Clerks expenses, LALC membership, stationery/printer cartridges, Training Courses for Councillors, Room hire for meetings (nil), Information Commissioners Fee = £6935.00

Insurance =  $\pounds$ 310.00 Internal Audit Fees =  $\pounds$ 80.00 Flower tubs =  $\pounds$ 75.00 Newsletter =  $\pounds$ 250.00 Contingency Fund =  $\pounds$ 700.00 Events Budget = nil (none spent in 2020/21) Parish Enhancement projects =  $\pounds$ 1000.00 Grounds maintenance =  $\pounds$ 350.00

Total =  $\pounds$ 9700.00 – Less  $\pounds$ 100 to be deducted from The Chase Account for administration =  $\pounds$ 9,600. Last year's Precept was  $\pounds$ 9673.

**Community Speed Watch** – The Speed Watch Team have now purchased a hand-held device for checking speed of vehicles, paid for from funds from District Councillor Mrs Anne Welburn's Community Fund and shared with Cherry Willingham Parish Council. The fund also covered high viz jackets which are worn by the Team when operating the device. The last time a Speedwatch enforcement session was carried out on Wragby Road East, some 503 vehicles were counted going West in one hour. Three vehicles were reported, including one doing 59mph in a 40mph limit.

Currently, due to lockdown, the Team are not able to hold any sessions. Once they are able to resume they would be pleased to hear from anybody who would like to volunteer for the scheme. **Pedestrian Crossing update –** It has come to the Council's attention that Wragby were to have **two** zebra crossings installed at no cost to their parish.

County Councillor Fleetwood had reported that the Head of Highways Asset Management, Mr Paul Little, confirmed that following a count on the A158 completed earlier in the year the location meets its threshold value for a crossing. Mr Little has requested a site visit with the Parish Council and CC Fleetwood to discuss issues for the best way forward. This is to be arranged but appears to be being held back by Lockdown.

Our District Councillor Mrs Anne Welburn has sought the support of West Lindsey District Council for funding towards a crossing.

Residents could also lend their support by writing to County Councillor Richard Davies or our MP **urging the provision of a pedestrian crossing**. This will hopefully help to produce a positive result before the reason for providing a crossing is caused by a death.

**The Chase Play Area** – the grass surface has suffered due to the activity by the bypass contractors and a vehicle which entered the area from the Hawthorn Road entrance following the removal of the safety barriers. A site meeting has been held with the Contractors Galliford Try, and representatives of the Parish Council and a temporary barrier erected. The contractors have stated that the fence is to be repaired and a bollard fitted to prevent unauthorised access to the open space and play area.

# **CENSUS 2021**

The census is coming. By taking part, you can help inform decisions on services that shape your community, such as healthcare, education and transport.

The census is a unique survey that happens every 10 years. It gives us a snapshot of all the people and households in England and Wales – the most detailed information we have about our society.

It's important that you fill in your census questionnaire. Without the information you share, it'd be more difficult to understand your community's needs and to plan and fund public services.

In one way or another, your information touches the lives of every single person living in England and Wales, whether it's through using census information to plan new schools, doctors' surgeries or bike lanes.

Because these things matter to us all, everyone needs to complete the census. Do not worry, government officials dealing with applications you've made or payments or services you receive cannot see it.

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) runs the census in England and Wales and is independent from government. Your details are protected by law and information published is always anonymous.

Census Day is Sunday 21 March 2021. You can fill yours in online as soon as you get your access code in the post. If your household circumstances change on Census Day, you can let the ONS know.

Everyone should have the support they need to fill in the census. If you, or anyone you know, needs help, there's a wide range of support services available.

These include a contact centre that can give you help over the phone and guidance in a range of languages and accessible formats, including paper questionnaires and large print.

#### Extra funding for Business support, Flooding and our single lane roads:

## Covid update:

Lincolnshire's overall infection rate is now significantly below the national average and has not reflected the rapid transmission seen in other parts of the country. Schools in England will not be reopening to all pupils until the 8 March 2021. The final decision will depend on meeting vaccination targets and schools would be given two weeks' notice.

#### Care homes update:

Working with Lincolnshire's NHS and partners, all care home residents over the age of 65 and care home staff have now been given the first dose of the Covid-19 vaccine. It means Lincolnshire meets the first of the national target dates in the vaccination programme and has protected the highest percentage of its care home residents across the Midlands Region. There are those staff and residents who couldn't have the vaccine due to illness or outbreak but they are being re-visited when it is safe to do so.

#### **Vaccination Roll-out:**

More good news on the vaccination front with a second large vaccination site in the county going live at the Lincolnshire Showground in addition to the main site in Boston. With 13 other general practice hubs and the two hospital hubs in the County the vaccination programme continues to gather pace. #### **Transport issues:**

There has been a lot of queries regarding transport to vaccination sites, as well as some general misunderstandings. Just to reiterate the Transport Helpline is <u>NOT</u> a booking service for transport. The Lincolnshire Transport Helpline provides information and advice on a wide range of transport options including community car schemes and CallConnect. The helpline operates from 9am-6pm Mon-Fri and 9.30am-4pm on Saturday. Our CallConnect on-demand bus service is paid for by the customer. If someone has a concessionary bus pass due to age or disability then they can access CallConnect free of charge. For the purposes of the COVID – 19 vaccination programme only, Transport Services have agreed to extend this free to anyone aged 67 and over, regardless of whether they have a bus pass or not. ## Looking after your mental health

A comprehensive range of support is available. A good place to start for self-help information and mental wellbeing guidance is Public Health England's Better Health – <u>Every Mind Matters NHS website</u> which has just launched its "When things aren't so good out there, make inside feel better" campaign. This encourages people experiencing difficulties to create <u>a free NHS-approved 'Mind Plan'</u>.

Locally Lincolnshire Partnership Foundation Trust (LPFT), the county's mental health and learning disability NHS trust, is offering a variety of wellbeing support, this includes a confidential emotional and mental health support line **0800 001 4331** available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. This enables callers to speak to an experienced support worker who will provide you with emotional support, advice and guidance.

LPFT also provides a talking therapies service <u>steps2change</u>. This service provides National Institute of Clinical Excellence (NICE) recommended, evidence-based interventions for people experiencing depression and a range of anxiety disorders. ## Arts funding for Lincoln's heritage sites to help digital learning:

## **CHOOSE HEALTH AND NATURE FOR YOUR DAILY HEALTH ROUTINE**

West Lindsey residents are being encouraged to take advantage of their daily exercise during the current lockdown, by strengthening their overall health – with the activity of litter picking.

Getting outdoors and feeling the fresh air is incredibly valuable for maintaining and strengthening physical and mental health – and residents can currently go outdoors and exercise within their households, their support bubbles or with one person from another household.

Litter picking is an activity that is easy to do and benefits residents' health individually – as well as benefiting entire communities and the natural world. WLDC also has a limited supply of free litter picking packs available to those who are interested – which include the following:

Community litter picker,	Handi Hoop,	High visibility vest
Disposable gloves,	Refuse sacks	Guidance notes

It is currently against the law for residents to leave their homes for all but essential reasons and we strongly advise that those interested in litter picking only take part with those in their household or support bubbles; residents are advised also to stay local within their own communities. Packs for two people or more are also available but new restrictions must be followed and adhered to if applying for more than a one-person pack. Further notes and guidelines can be found within the litter packs themselves.

Though this litter picking initiative officially began in 2019, WLDC has been supporting community litter picking since 2011, with available grant money being used in 2018 to expand the support further. Please note that the litter-picking packs are available on a first-come, first-served basis as there is only a limited supply available.

Equipment can be kept by those wishing to take on litter picking regularly, or the equipment can be loaned if residents wish only to try the activity a handful of times.
