PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Gateways for North Greetwell – The Parish Council has been successful in obtaining a grant in order to part fund the Gateways for the eastern end of the parish by the 'Greetwell' sign. These have been ordered and will be sited very shortly. Residents may have seen these in other parishes – Sturton By Stow have them – it is hoped that they will make a difference in reducing the speed of traffic on the A158 through North Greetwell.

Your Parish Council continues to take seriously the problems crossing the A158 and the Chairman has written the following letter to Edward Leigh MP; Councillor Richard Davies, Portfolio Holder for Highways; District Councillor Steve England, Chairman WLDC:-

'Over the last few months I have found the traffic situation on the A158 at North Greetwell almost unbearable. Local residents are virtually prisoners in their own homes unless they resort to adding to the chaos by using their own vehicles. It is particularly bad for those of us who live on the northern side of this road.

We are finding it almost impossible to walk in our local area. On numerous occasions I have tried to cross the A158 in order to walk my dog only to give up and return for my car in order to get out to another venue away from home. Last week I thought I would persevere and wait to cross the road; 14 minutes later I was able to cross both carriageways safely. I waited a further 8 minutes to cross back to my property.

Over the past three years the Parish Council has requested a number of times for the community to be provided with a controlled crossing only to be told this would need to be joint funded to the tune of approximately \pounds 120,000. As a small community spread over three distinct areas it is an unrealistic proposition to add such a sum to our precept which is around \pounds 7,000.

I recently attended a site meeting in my capacity as a Greetwell Parish Councillor with Highways officials looking into upgrading the cycle oath along the A158. There is evidently a £200,000 pot available for this project. The number of people cycling along this stretch of road is negligible and the cycle path is adequate at this time. Surely it would be better to reconnect our community by providing a controlled crossing. This would mean more people could safely access our local shop at the garage, use the restaurant and be assured they could cross safely when returning on the local bus.

We are the only community of this size on the whole A158 who do not have access to a crossing. I therefore implore you to revisit the issue and look to providing a controlled crossing at the earliest opportunity at North Greetwell. I can only see it as a matter of time before we lose one of our residents whilst attempting to cross what is acknowledged to be the busiest road of its type in/out of the Lincoln area at this time'.

Shrubs, trees and hedges - The Parish Council thanks those residents who have recently cut back their hedges and trees which were overhanging the footways. This reduces the problem of rubbing shoulders through often wet foliage for users of the footway be they dog walking, pushing a buggy or in a wheelchair.

Westfield Avenue - Thank you also to County Councillor Ian Fleetwood who recently strimmed the roundabout on Westfield Avenue and to the resident who collected all the debris in her barrow.

There has been complaints to the Parish Council about parking on the roadside and pathways, particularly on Westfield Avenue. This is making it difficult for footpath users. Please be aware there must be space left on the road for an emergency vehicle to pass and also on the footway for a wheelchair or pram to access. The matter has been passed to the Police.

Thefts from garages - There has been a spate of thefts from garages in the area – residents are urged by our local PCSO to be extra vigilant in locking up outbuildings.

How Should Your Money Be Spent?

West Lindsey District Council has launched its budget consultation and is urging residents and businesses to have their say on its budget.

The Council will be looking to set its council tax as it makes preparations for it budget for 2020 to 2021. It is offering people an opportunity, to understand the current financial situation and share their priorities. Helping to make sure that money is spent on local people's priorities.

Leader of the Council, Cllr Giles McNeill said:

"The district council is responsible for a multi-million pound spend of public money. It matter to me that the things we do are the things local people want us to be doing. By taking part in the consultation you can directly shape the final budget for next year.

"I want to make sure that we're tackling the challenges we face – climate change, a growing population, the availability of scare resources and the lifting of people out of real hardship and poverty.

"Giving people a better quality of life, their wellbeing, is really important. How the decisions we take – and the things we do – will enrich and enhance people's quality of life is the cornerstone to deliver a better life and a chance for a bright future for everyone in West Lindsey."

With reduced budgets from central government it is critical that the Council directs its resources in a way that benefits residents and meets their needs and priorities.

In the last few years the Council has lost £4 million grant funding - but what it has done is generate additional income in excess of £1.7 million and deliver efficiencies savings of around £2.3 million.

Ian Knowles, Executive Director of Resources and Head of Paid Service at the Council, said:

"We are asking residents to prioritise what money we spend rather than where we take money away from this year, so I am really keen to see this as a turning point for us in terms of budget consultation.

"What we really want to do is make sure we are focussing on the priorities that residents have, and not just the priorities that we as an authority perceive."

The Council has prepared a video to showcase the challenges, its services and some of its successes, which can be used to help inform residents prior to taking part in the consultation.

Three events across the district have been arranged for people to attend and ask questions, as part of the budget consultation.

Alternatively the consultation can be completed on line through the council's website or by requesting a paper survey.

Our nearest event will take place in a friendly group atmosphere at The Old School, Nettleham between 2 - 4 pm on Thursday 8th August.

This consultation starts today (Monday, July 8) and will close at 9am on 2 September 2019. More details are available at www.west-Lindsey.gov.uk/budget2019

Help boost broadband in rural Lincolnshire:

The county council is urging local communities and businesses not to miss out on government funding to boost broadband speeds in their area. There are currently two schemes that provide funding for broadband improvements in rural areas.

The Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme provides grants of £500 - £2,500 towards the cost of full fibre broadband, which offers much faster and more reliable speeds.

Hard-to-reach communities and businesses could also benefit from the Rural Gigabit Connectivity Scheme, which is targeted at those areas that are unlikely to benefit from private sector investment in the near future.

Local organisations, such as schools and parish councils, can bid for funding to install a gigabit connection to a public building, which will in turn make the surrounding area more likely to attract commercial investment.

RAF BENEVOLENT FUND LAUNCHES NEW COMMUNITY SCHEME TO HELP ISOLATED RAF VETERANS

Lincolnshire, Norfolk, Suffolk and Cambridgeshire have been selected as pilot locations for a new project aimed at supporting RAF veterans who face loneliness and isolation.

The RAF Benevolent Fund, the RAF's leading welfare charity, is launching a Community Engagement Worker scheme to help older RAF veterans get involved in their local communities. The scheme comes in response to research carried out by the Fund which highlighted these challenges as issues which most concern the older generation of RAF veterans.

Pete Ashcroft, Welfare Projects Manager at the RAF Benevolent Fund, said:

"The Community Engagement Worker project is just one measure we have introduced to tackle the issue of loneliness and social isolation among older veterans. Other new initiatives include telephone friendship groups and group wellbeing breaks. This year marks the RAF Benevolent Fund's centenary and we are asking the public to help us reach out to the members of the RAF Family who may have fallen off the radar and let them know, we are here to help. We want to ensure every RAF veteran, no matter how long they served, including National Service, receives the support their service to their country deserves. We want to get these people back onto the radar, and we aim to almost double the number of people we help – from 53,000 to at least 100,000 over the next three years".

The Community Engagement Workers will get to know the social activities, groups and associations across the four counties and work with individuals to understand what the barriers are to them becoming more socially engaged and help them to overcome that, from attending a veterans' breakfast meeting with someone for the first time, to establishing activities where none currently exist.

Graeme Spark, of Grantham, will be taking on the Lincolnshire Community Engagement Worker role. His 29-year career in the Royal Air Force means he knows the service well.

He said: "It has always been deeply humbling, the sacrifices that those who fought before us made and as an RAF veteran I have some insight into that. "This is an opportunity of a lifetime, and I feel like I'm part of the RAF family again. Success in this job is going to be very different for each person. This is about individuals and what they need to feel part of the RAF Family, and the wider community again."

NETTLEHAM MEDICAL PRACTICE

CLINICAL PHARMACIST - The practice has been fortunate enough to have two new clinical pharmacists in the practice following a successful bid by Imp Healthcare federation and NHS England.

James and Sarah are highly qualified health professionals who train for many years to become specialists in medicines and how they work. They can work directly with you, as part of the general practice team, to make sure your medicines help you get better and stay well. Having a clinical pharmacist in the practice team means you can be treated by the best professional for your needs.

All pharmacists are registered with the General Pharmaceutical Council. More information is available on our website or from the practice in the form of a patient information leaflet.

When will I see a clinical pharmacist? - You will see a clinical pharmacist when you need expert advice on your medicines. If your condition needs diagnosing, you will usually see a GP first, who may then refer you on to a practice nurse or clinical pharmacist. Below are some examples of how a clinical pharmacist can help:

Long-term conditions - If you have a condition such as asthma, type 2 diabetes, arthritis or high blood pressure, the clinical pharmacist can discuss the medicines you're taking to make sure they're working for you. They can also help you with lifestyle changes to help you manage your condition.

Experiencing side effects - If you are experiencing side effects from your medicines, you and the clinical pharmacist can discuss this and work together to find a solution, such as changing your medicine or the dosage. If you are taking a number of different medicines, the clinical pharmacist can help make sure they are working well together.

Reviewing your medicines - If you are taking medicines over the long-term, you should be seen for a review at least once a year. The clinical pharmacist can review all your medicines, discuss how they are working for you and carry out health checks, such as taking your blood pressure. They can also arrange for you to have blood or other tests.

After a stay in hospital - If your medicines have been changed while you were in hospital, the clinical pharmacist can help explain these changes and ensure you get the maximum benefit from these medicines. **Your appointment -** Just as when you see a GP or a practice nurse, you will see a clinical pharmacist in a private consultation room. Seeing the pharmacist does not replace an appointment with a doctor. You will still be able to see your GP if you need to. A clinical pharmacist will not give you your medicines. You should collect your medicines from a community pharmacy or dispensing doctor in the usual way.

The practice has recently had automatic front doors installed at Nettleham and want to thank the Nettleham Patient Participation Group for their kind donation which has helped fund this improvement.

CALL CONNECT

CallConnect is a demand responsive bus service and is available in your local area. CallConnect has been established for over 18 years and is designed to increase connectivity for people who have limited or no public transport in their area; helping to reduce social isolation in rural Lincolnshire. The bus can be used by anyone for any reason including travelling to work, school, medical appointments and social trips.
